Martyrs Menodora, Metrodora, and Nymphodora, at Nicomedia

Commemorated on September 10

The Holy Virgins Menodora, Nymphodora, and Metrodora (305-311), were sisters from Bithynia (Asia Minor). Distinguished for their special piety, they wanted to preserve their virginity and avoid worldly associations. They chose a solitary place for themselves in the wilderness and spent their lives in deeds of fasting and prayer.

Reports of the holy life of the virgins soon spread, since healings of the sick began to occur through their prayers. The Bithynia region was governed at that time by a man named Frontonus, who ordered that the sisters be arrested and brought before him.

At first he tried to persuade them to renounce Christ, promising great honors and rewards. But the holy sisters steadfastly confessed their faith before him, rejecting all his suggestions. They told him that they did not value the temporal things of this world, and that they were prepared to die for their Heavenly Bridegroom, for death would be their gateway to eternal life.

Flying into a rage, the governor took out his wrath on Saint Menodora, the eldest sister. She was stripped of her clothes and beaten by four men, while a herald urged her to offer sacrifice to the gods. The saint bravely endured the torments and cried out, "Sacrifice? Can't you see that I am offering myself as a sacrifice to my God?" Then they renewed their torments with even greater severity. Then the martyr cried out, "Lord Jesus Christ, joy of my heart, my hope, receive my soul in peace." With these words she gave up her soul to God, and went to her Heavenly Bridegroom.

Four days later, they brought the two younger sisters Metrodora and Nymphodora to the court. They showed them the battered body of their older sister to frighten them. The virgins wept over her, but remained steadfast.

Then Saint Metrodora was tortured. She died, crying out to her beloved Lord Jesus Christ with her last breath. Then they turned to the third sister, Nymphodora. Before her lay the bruised bodies of her sisters. Frontonus hoped that this sight would intimidate the young virgin.

Pretending that he was charmed by her youth and beauty, he urged her to worship the pagan gods, promising great rewards and honors. Saint Nymphodora scoffed at his words, and shared the fate of her older sisters. She was tortured and beaten to death with iron rods.

The bodies of the holy martyrs were to be burned in a fire, but a heavy rain extinguished the blazing fire, and lightning struck down Frontonus and his servant. Christians took up the bodies of the holy sisters and reverently buried them at the so-called Warm Springs at Pythias (Bithynia).

Part of the relics of the holy martyrs are preserved on Mt. Athos in the Protection cathedral of the Saint Panteleimon Russian monastery, and the hand of Saint Metrodora is on the Holy Mountain in the monastery of the Pantocrator.



And Jesus answered and spoke to them again by parables and said: "The kingdom of heaven is like a certain king who arranged a marriage for his son, and sent out his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding; and they were not willing to come. Again, he sent out other servants, saying, 'Tell those who are invited, "See, I have prepared my dinner; my oxen and fatted cattle are killed, and all things are ready. Come to the wedding." But they made light of it and went their ways, one to his own farm, another to his business. And the rest seized his servants, treated them spitefully. and killed them. But when the king heard about it, he was furious. And he sent out his armies, destroyed those murderers, and burned up their city. Then he said to his servants, 'The wedding is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy. Therefore go into the highways, and as many as you find, invite to the wedding.' So those servants went out into the highways and gathered together all whom they found, both bad and good. And the wedding hall was filled with guests. But when the king came in to see the guests, he saw a man there who did not have on a wedding garment. So he said to him, 'Friend, how did you come in here without a wedding garment?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the servants, 'Bind him hand and foot, take him away, and cast him into outer darkness; there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

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ARCHPASTORAL GREETINGS OF THE MOST REVEREND DANIEL, ARCHBISHOP OF CHICAGO AND THE MIDWEST, ON THE OCCASION OF THE BEGINNING OF THE INDICTION & THE ECCLESIASTICAL NEW YEAR

Beloved Clergy, Monastics, and Faithful of the Diocese of the Midwest:

Thy Nativity, O Virgin Theotokos, hath proclaimed joy to the whole world,

for from thee hath shone forth the Sun of Righteousness, Christ our God,

Who annulling the curse hath bestowed blessing, and destroying death hath granted us eternal life.

-Troparion of the Feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos

For Orthodox Christians, September 1st marks the start of the New Church Year, also known as the Beginning of the Indiction. As we enter this New Year of Grace, the first Great Feast that we celebrate is the Feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos, September 8.

In reflecting on the birth of Mary of Nazareth and her singular role in the history of salvation, we notice that the Gospel of John speaks of only two moments when the public life of Jesus directly intersects with His Mother. Of course, Mary's very life was intimately connected to that of her Son from the very moment of His conception, and Matthew and Luke make special note of this in their Infancy Narratives. However, John only mentions these two moments: the beginning of the Lord's public ministry at the wedding feast in Cana (John 2:1-12) and the moment when Mary stands beneath the Cross (John 19:25-27). Perhaps the Holy Evangelist wants to show us the Mother of Jesus in these two completely opposite situations in human life: the bright joy of a wedding feast and the profound sorrow at the death of a child.

Let us hone in, however, on the special place of Mary in John's account of the Lord's Passion and Death. The first thing that John mentions is Mary "standing near the cross of Jesus" (John 19:25), close to her Son as He suffered the pains of the Cross and shed His blood for the salvation of mankind. Mary stood there, at the foot of the cross, filled with sorrow—yet with unwavering conviction, courage, and fidelity. This is the main way that Mary appears in the Gospel of John: she stands near those who suffer and want, those rejected and marginalized by the world, those on the very fringes of our social and economic order. It is in this role as Mother that Mary stands close by us all, steadfast and faithful near the cross of human sorrow and suffering, yet ever under the shadow of the Cross of Her Son.

In this way, Mary also teaches us how to "stand near" these situations. It demands more than simply acknowledging the realities of human suffering; rather, those in painful situations should feel us standing faithfully and fearlessly at their side. All those suffer any pain or loss can experience the Mother who remains near them, for in their sufferings she sees the open wounds of her Son Jesus. She learned this at the foot of the cross. We too are called to respond to the sufferings of others. Following the example of Mary, let us go out to meet our suffering brothers and sisters, to console them and accompany them. Let us not be afraid to experience the power of tenderness, to be involved, even in the most uncomfortable of situations, and to let our lives become complicated for the sake of others. Inspired by Her, the Most Pure One, let us remain steadfast and faithful, our hearts at peace in God in even the most difficult circumstances of life. Let us be ever ready to lift up the fallen, raise up the lowly, showing them the love and that "peace beyond understanding" that only comes from God (cf. Philippians 4:7).

Grateful that the beginning of September brings with it this special Feast, let us also acknowledge that every day of every year, no matter the month or the season, offers us the grace-filled occasion to give thanks to God for His many blessings, just as each day presents the opportunity to be present with those who are suffering in any way. Every day of every year invites us to draw closer to Christ, to grow in holiness, to bear witness to our faith, and to continue stand with those who are suffering and in any kind of need. As we enter into the New Church Year, we look forward to another Year of Grace, living the Gospel, serving our brothers and sisters, and experiencing the Church's liturgical cycle which invites us to enter, ever more deeply, into the great mystery of our salvation.

In this new Ecclesiastical Year, let us entrust ourselves, our families and loved ones, our parishes, and all the world to the loving maternal care and protection of the Holy Theotokos.

On Thursday morning, His Beatitude was welcomed to the seminary by Archpriest John Parker, Dean, Archpriest Patrick Burns, Alumni Association President, and seminary staff, students, alumni, and their families. His Beatitude addressed seminarians in the Convocation Center, welcoming them to the seminary on behalf of the Holy Synod of Bishops and the seminary Board of Trustees. In his address, he encouraged seminarians to maintain their discipline and enthusiasm and to always trust in Christ. At the conclusion of his address, His Beatitude answered questions from seminarians and alumni before blessing first-year seminarians to wear cassocks. Following lunch, Father Andrew Stephen Damick, Chief Content Officer of Ancient Faith Ministries and Saint Tikhon's Seminary alumnus, led the first of two seminars entitled "Preaching the Gospel in a Land of Confusion." After vespers and matins in the monastery church, a cookout was hosted by the Alumni Association.

Metropolitan Tikhon visits All Saints of America in Alexandria, VA

On Saturday, August 26, and Sunday, August 27, His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon made an archpastoral visit to All Saints of America Church in Alexandria, VA.

At the celebration of the Divine Liturgy on Sunday, His Beatitude elevated Priest Alessandro Margheritino, who is serving both as the parish priest and the Secretary of the Orthodox Church in America, to the dignity of archpriest.

At the conclusion of the liturgy, His Beatitude greeted the faithful and announced that All Saints of America would be raised from mission to parish status effective September 1.

His Beatitude also presented relics of American saints, the heavenly patrons of the community, as well as a new antimension, the first assigned to the community since its founding in 2008 by the late Archpriest Michael Koblosh.

Axios to the Archpriest Alessandro and many years to the All Saints of America community!

Schedule Announced for Episcopal Consecration of Archimandrite Nikodhim

The schedule information for the episcopal consecration of Bishop-elect V. Rev. Archimandrite Nikodhim has been made available.

The consecration will take place on Saturday, September 16, 2023 at Saint George Albanian Orthodox Cathedral. Matins will begin at 9:00 AM followed by His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon presiding at the celebration of the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy, at which time Archimandrite Nikodhim will be consecrated to the episcopacy of the Albanian Orthodox Archdiocese in America.

A luncheon is to follow in the Athanas Auditorium.

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OCA young adults participate in Suprasl 2023

Seven young adults representing the Orthodox Church in America were among the more than seventy participants from around the world who participated in Suprasl 2023, the second annual World Gathering of Orthodox Youth [WGOY] that took place August 10-18 at the Suprasl Academy in the Monastery of the Annunciation.

The event attracted over 140 applicants from Poland, Italy, Mexico, France, Albania, Finland, Australia, the United States, Canada, Greece, Germany, and many other countries. This year's participants represented 10 of the world's autocephalous Orthodox Churches. The gathering was organized by the recently established Suprasl: A World Fellowship of Orthodox Youth which seeks to provide a venue and opportunities for Orthodox youth to celebrate their common faith in Jesus Christ, share their culture and lives, and support and encourage each other through prayer and fellowship.

The week-long event explored the theme "Bear Witness of the Light,"(Jn. 1:7) through workshops and lectures offered by speakers from the U.K., Serbia, the U.S., Romania, Belarus, and Poland. "This year's gathering was unique in that the participants not only participated in lectures and workshops of a spiritual and theological nature but two days of the event were dedicated to a miniyouth leadership training course," said Mr. Dawid Szejbut, the event's assistant director.

Archpriest John Behr, Regius Professor of Humanity at the University of Aberdeen, headed the list of speakers by offering a series of lectures on the theme of the week. Father John encouraged the participants to adopt the mind of the Holy Scriptures in their lives and challenged them to become better acquainted with Holy Scripture through dedicated reading and study so that they might more effectively "bear witness of light" (Jn.1:7). The other keynote lecture of the week was offered by Dr. Alexandra Stevanovich, Research Associate Center for the Scientific Research Faculty of Philology and Arts University of Kragujevac, Serbia, on Orthodoxy & Artificial Intelligence. Through her lecture and a secondary workshop Stevanovich explored the subtle connections between AI and Orthodoxy, the challenges and opportunities that AI poses to spiritual life, and what it means to be human in the AI world.

Other workshops and presentations were on effective leadership, Orthodoxy and life, ecology, Byzantine Chant, creating Orthodox media and cheesemaking were given by Piotr Michalczuk and Izabela Senderacka, members of Suprasl's leadership training team, Poland; Teodora Paul, Romania; Michael Azar, USA; Eugeny Lobanov, director of Suprasl's ecology initiatives, Belarus; and Elie Shackelford Bernasol, Ancient Faith Ministries, USA.

A highlight of the schedule was the performance of the original play based on the life of Saint Maria of Paris titled, "No Once Can be a Number", performed by a local amateur theater group. The life of Saint Maria and the focus of the play on refugee life in France in the 1930s was particularly poignant considering the present worldwide refugee crisis. The performance left the participants with a desire to act in their local and regional communities. "Saint Maria is a saint that I myself feel very close to", said Elizabeth Sedor, St Mark Church, Bethesda, Maryland. "This conference is aiming to create Orthodox leaders, to build bridges between countries, and to create action...and this is what Saint Maria wanted, her example of doing something, anything, whatever somebody asks you to do, whatever somebody needs you to do, that's the sort of leadership the world needs, and that is what Suprasl 2023 has instilled in us."

Each day of the gathering began and finished with prayers and a spiritual reflection in the monastery's cathedral church led by the gathering's chaplain, Priest Theodore Svane from Norway with prayers and hymns read and sung in multiple languages.

Participants of the WGOY also participated in the annual pilgrimage to the Holy Mountain of Grabarka for the Feast of the Transfiguration joining thousands of pilgrims on the final day of the five-day walking pilgrimage bearing a cross painted by gathering participant Nina Misijuk. Following the vigil service for the feast, Metropolitan Sawa of Warsaw and All Poland met with the participants to congratulate them on their participation in the gathering. During the address, he encouraged them to remain faithful and work hard for the growth and continuation of Christ's mission in their communities. The youth presented His Beatitude with a framed t-shirt made specially for the gathering and signed by all the participants .

"I had the privilege to travel to Poland to attend Suprasl 2023," said Savannah Foster, Nativity of the Lord Mission, Shreveport, Louisiana. "Not only did I leave more about Holy Scriptures through Fr John's lectures, but also learned more about myself. I made lifelong friendships from all over the world, and I learned what it means to carry your cross with 10,000 other Orthodox Christians as we walked on the pilgrimage.
