# New SVS Press Book Project on North American Liturgical Art Calling for Submissions

The Institute of Sacred Arts (ISA) at St Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary (SVOTS) is producing a new book entitled Lord, It Is Good to Be Here! Orthodox Liturgical Art in North America, to be published by St Vladimir's Seminary Press.

This major book project will highlight the finest exemplars of Orthodox Christian liturgical art and architecture from across the North American continent. It will feature high-quality images supported by essays that provide historical, theological, and other context.

With this announcement, the book's coeditors—Dr Peter Bouteneff, founding director of the Institute of Sacred Arts and Professor of Systematic Theology at SVOTS, and Andrew Gould, liturgical designer and founder and owner of the Orthodox Arts Journal and of the design firm New World Byzantine—are making a continent-wide call for submissions.

Orthodox Christians of all jurisdictions are invited to send in examples of uniquely North American liturgical art and architecture for possible publication. Historic and contemporary churches, icons, liturgical furnishings, vessels, textiles, manuscripts, and other artistic media will all be considered.

Iconographers, furniture makers, embroiderers, and other liturgical artists interested in creating an artwork especially for the book are also invited to contact the project team.

Dr Peter Bouteneff elaborated on the rationale behind this project, saying:

While the core of the Church's theology is unchanging, the languages, idioms, and images through which it is expressed have always adapted to new places and times. This book will celebrate some of the best examples of the Old World-New World encounter: art that testifies to the ongoing relationship between timeless Gospel and historical culture, and that through its beauty and its content inspires and expresses the right praise of God.

The book is to be published by SVS Press under its new Sacred Arts imprint, which the Press is inaugurating in collaboration with the seminary's Institute of Sacred Arts.

# **Luke 10:25-37 (Gospel)**

And behold, a certain lawyer stood up and tested Him, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What is your reading of it?" So he answered and said, "'You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind,' and 'your neighbor as yourself." And He said to him, "You have answered rightly; do this and you will live." But he, wanting to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Then Jesus answered and said: "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a certain priest came down that road. And when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. Likewise a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came and looked, and passed by on the other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had compassion. So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you.' So which of these three do you think was neighbor to him who fell among the thieves?" And he said, "He who showed mercy on him." Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

# OCPM and St. Tikhon's Orthodox Theological Seminary Now Offering a Certificate Program in Prison Ministry

Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry (OCPM) and Saint Tikhon's Orthodox Theological Seminary (STOTS) have partnered together to create the new Certificate Program in Prison Ministry, the first program of its kind in the United States.

The Certificate Program in Prison Ministry provides clergy and lay volunteers that are interested in prison ministry the opportunity to gain knowledge and experience to effectively lead and support people in prison. Students will learn from the most experienced chaplains and volunteers in Orthodox prison ministry in the country.

"In such a specialized ministry, there has been a need for this level of training for decades," says Nicholas Petrogeorge, OCPM Executive Director. "While more and more churches and individuals reaching out to us, wanting to begin or further their local prison ministries, many don't have the means to effectively train for what they are called to do. Now that is all about to change."

STOTS and OCPM have been developing their relationship over the last thirty years, because the seminary is uniquely close to a state prison, SCI Waymart, where seminarians participate in a semester internship under the direction of the Very Rev. Fr. John Kowalczyk, Assistant Professor of Pastoral Theology and OCPM's Co-Director of Training and Spiritual Care. Today, SCI Waymart and STOTS have grown to a mutually beneficial relationship: inmates are consoled by the frequent visits and services led by the seminarians, and the seminarians are spiritually moved by their encounters with those in prison.

"From its founding, Saint Tikhon's has always strived to nurture the theological vocations of our students," says Archpriest John Parker, Dean and Chief Operating Officer of STOTS. "This is the next natural step for this seminary. We want to support you in your calling to prison ministry through the best education and experience we can offer."

The semester-long program covers all essential aspects of prison ministry and combines theoretical knowledge with practical skills to ensure participants develop an Orthodox approach to the unique challenges faced in correctional settings. Through this program students will also learn how to assist families in coping with the challenges of having a loved one in prison, as well as how to assist clergy by offering guidance to deal with the unique needs that their parish may face because of incarceration.

The Certificate Program in Prison Ministry culminates in a residency on the campus of Saint Tikhon's Seminary. Students will enter the prison daily as volunteers and shadow instructors as they make rounds, have short Bible studies, and practice "the ministry of presence," talking with inmates, praying with them, and learning from them.

# Saint John the Merciful, Patriarch of Alexandria

#### **Commemorated on November 12**

Saint John the Merciful, Patriarch of Alexandria, was born on Cyprus in the seventh century into the family of the illustrious dignitary Epiphanius. At the wish of his parents he entered into marriage and had children. When the wife and the children of the saint died, he became a monk. He was zealous in fasting and prayer, and had great love for those around him.

His spiritual exploits won him honor among men, and even the emperor revered him. When the Patriarchal throne of Alexandria fell vacant, the emperor Heraclius and all the clergy begged Saint John to occupy the Patriarchal throne.

The saint worthily assumed his archpastoral service, concerning himself with the moral and dogmatic welfare of his flock. As patriarch he denounced every soul-destroying heresy, and drove out from Alexandria the Monophysite Phyllonos of Antioch.

He considered his chief task to be charitable and to give help all those in need. At the beginning of his patriarchal service he ordered his stewards to compile a list of all the poor and downtrodden in Alexandria, which turned out to be over seven thousand men. The saint ordered that all of these unfortunates be provided for each day out of the church's treasury.

Twice during the week, on Wednesdays and Fridays, he emerged from the doors of the patriarchal cathedral, and sitting on the church portico, he received everyone in need. He settled quarrels, helped the wronged, and distributed alms. Three times a week he visited the sick-houses, and rendered assistance to the suffering. It was during this period that the emperor Heraclius led a tremendous army against the Persian emperor Chosroes II. The Persians ravaged and burned Jerusalem, taking a multitude of captives. The holy Patriarch John gave a large portion of the church treasury for their ransom.

The saint never refused suppliants. One day, when the saint was visiting the sick, he met a beggar and commanded that he be given six silver coins. The beggar changed his clothes, ran on ahead of the Patriarch, and again asked for alms. Saint John gave him six more silver coins. When, however, the beggar sought charity a third time, and the servants began to chase the fellow away, the Patriarch ordered that he be given twelve pieces of silver, saying, "Perhaps he is Christ putting me to the

test." Twice the saint gave money to a merchant that had suffered shipwreck, and a third time gave him a ship belonging to the Patriarchate and filled with grain, with which the merchant had a successful journey and repaid his obligations.

Saint John the Merciful was known for his gentle attitude towards people. Once, the saint was compelled to excommunicate two clergymen for a certain time because of some offense. One of them repented, but the other fellow became angry with the Patriarch and fell into greater sins. The saint wanted to summon him and calm him with kind words, but it slipped his mind. When he was celebrating the Divine Liturgy, the saint was suddenly reminded by the words of the Gospel: "If you bring your gift to the altar and remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift before the altar ... first, be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift" (Mt. 5:23-24). The saint came out of the altar, called the offending clergyman to him, and falling down on his knees before him in front of all the people he asked forgiveness. The cleric, filled with remorse, repented of his sin, corrected himself, and afterwards was found worthy to be ordained to the priesthood.

There was a time when a certain citizen insulted George, the Patriarch's nephew. George asked the saint to avenge the wrong. The saint promised to deal with the offender so that all of Alexandria would marvel at what he had done. This calmed George, and Saint John began to instruct him, speaking of the necessity for meekness and humility. Then he summoned the man who insulted George. When Saint John learned that the man lived in a house owned by the church, he declared that he would excuse him from paying rent for an entire year. Alexandria indeed was amazed by such a "revenge," and George learned from his uncle how to forgive offenses and to bear insults for God's sake.

Saint John, a strict ascetic and man of prayer, was always mindful of his soul, and of death. He ordered a coffin for himself, but told the craftsmen not to finish it. Instead, he would have them come each feastday and ask if it was time to finish the work.

Saint John was persuaded to accompany the governor Nicetas on a visit to the emperor in Constantinople. While on his way to visit the earthly king, he dreamed of a resplendent man who said to him, "The King of Kings summons you." He sailed to his native island of Cyprus, and at Amanthos the saint peacefully fell asleep in the Lord (616-620).

# 120 Years Later: The Great Missionary Saint of America and Martyr Commemorated in the Cathedral He Built

Hieromartyr John of Chicago, a feast of great importance to the Diocese of the Midwest and locally in Chicago, was celebrated on Monday, October 30 and Tuesday, October 31. The celebration took place at the very temple that he built in the city of Chicago, Holy Trinity Cathedral, the Diocesan Cathedral of the diocese. Services for the feast were led by His Eminence Archbishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest and ended the Cathedral's month long celebration honoring the saint.

The All Night Vigil was served on Monday evening welcoming Orthodox Christians from all over the Chicago area. Serving with the Archbishop were, Priest Alexander Koranda, Cathedral Dean, Archpriest Mykola Bodnarchuk, Archpriest Athanasios Chulakov of the Bulgarian Orthodox Church, Hieromonk Ephraim of the Serbian Orthodox Church, Priest Leonty Naidzions of the Russian Orthodox Church Abroad, Archpriest Herman Kincaide, Priest John Kennerk, Priest Nikolai Lochmatow, Protodeacon Thomas Keith and Deacon Paul Garklavs. The choir was directed by Olga Garklavs.

On the next day, Tuesday, October 31, Archbishop Daniel served as the main celebrant for the Divine Liturgy and joining the Archbishop were Priest Alexander Koranda, Cathedral Dean, Mitered Archpriest Vladimir Kovalchuk, Priest Antony Alekseyenko and Priest Leonty Naidzions of the Russian Orthodox Church Abroad, Priest Jacob Van Sickle, Priest John Kennerk, Priest Anthony Saunders, Priest Nikolai Lochmatow, Priest Joseph Whittaker, Protodeacon Thomas Keith, Protodeacon Dionisiy Lvov, and Deacon Paul Garklavs. Priest Esteban Vázquez, Diocesan Vice-Chancellor, was in prayerful attendance. The choir was directed by Olga Garklavs.

At the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, His Eminence offered words of praise to St. John and reminding those gathered of the great joy that it is to be able to serve and worship in the historic temple that the saint built. Fr. Alexander welcomed his brother clergy on this "feast of priests", asking St. John to help and protect them in their priestly ministry. Following the Prayers of Thanksgiving, a festive meal was held in the cathedral hall.

It was in 1899 that Father John Kochurov commissioned noted architect Louis Sullivan to construct what is today Holy Trinity Cathedral. The new church was consecrated by Saint Tikhon of Moscow in 1903 and designated a cathedral in 1922. After his return to Russia, Father John became the first clergyman to be martyred at the outset of the Bolshevik Revolution. He was glorified as Saint John of Chicago and Tsarskoye Tselo in December 1994.

# The Diocese of the Midwest Welcomes the Holy Synod of the OCA

The Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America, meeting under the presidency of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon, is holding the Regular Fall 2023 Session, this week at the historic Holy Trinity Cathedral, Chicago, IL.

On Monday, November 6, His Eminence Archbishop Daniel greeted His Beatitude at the airport, welcoming the Metropolitan to the Diocese of the Midwest. On the following day, Tuesday, November 7, the Synod Meetings began with an opening Molebien and address from the Metropolitan. During the course of the meeting the Reverend Hieromonk Benedict (Churchill) was canonically elected as the Bishop of Hartford and the Diocese of New England.

Meetings are scheduled throughout the day with the hierarchs gathering for the All Night Vigil in the evening to welcome the feast of angels.

# Holy Synod elects Hieromonk Benedict as Bishop of Hartford and the Diocese of New England

On Tuesday, November 7, 2023, the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America, meeting under the presidency of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon at Holy Trinity Cathedral in Chicago, IL, at its Regular Fall 2023 Session, canonically elected the Reverend Hieromonk Benedict (Churchill) as the Bishop of Hartford and the Diocese of New England. Father Benedict had been nominated by the Diocese of New England by their special nominating assembly on October 28, 2023.

Tomorrow, His Eminence Archbishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest will preside at the celebration of the Divine Liturgy, at which time he will elevate Fr. Benedict to the rank of archimandrite at Holy Trinity Cathedral, Chicago, IL.

The episcopal ordination has been scheduled for December 1-2, 2023, at Holy Trinity Cathedral in Boston, MA.
