Washington Court Issues Order Protecting Seal of Confession

On Friday, October 10, 2025, attorneys for the State of Washington filed a stipulated Order through which the state government and its county prosecutors agreed to entry of a permanent injunction from enforcing a law that would have required priests to report certain information obtained through the Sacrament of Confession. The State of Washington further agreed not to deny clergy the benefit of any privileged communication exceptions that are available under the law to other mandatory reporters.

This is a significant legal victory not only for Orthodox Christians, but for all Christians who recognize the Sacrament of Confession or sacred confidences. This successful outcome is the result of a legal challenge brought earlier this year by the Orthodox Church in America and several other Orthodox jurisdictions and clergy in response to a Washington State law that specifically targeted clergy and would have compelled priests to violate the Seal of Confession under a wide variety of circumstances. Such an outcome would have forced priests to choose between following canon law or secular law, a choice that carried with it the penalty of significant fines and even imprisonment. Moreover, the unwarranted intrusion of the government into the Sacrament of Confession would ultimately have deterred many penitents from seeking absolution in the first place.

This ruling represents an important affirmation of religious freedom for Christians everywhere, and the Orthodox Church in America is grateful to all who contributed to this effort on behalf of clergy and faithful.

Commenting on the ruling, His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon said, "The bishops and priests of the Orthodox Church in America carry a sacred obligation to maintain the seal of confession without compromise. This decision affirms that duty both in law and in conscience. We thank God for this resolution and for all who labored to bring it about."

Varus and her son appeared to Cleopatra in a dream, radiant in bright attire with crowns upon their heads. She realized that the Lord had received her son into the heavenly Kingdom, and was comforted. The 2026 Desk Calendar of the Orthodox Church in America is currently in print and is now available in PDF format. Please see national OCA website.

The calendar includes ample space for daily notations and memos, along with a comprehensive directory of OCA ministries, departments, boards, commissions, diocesan chanceries, and seminaries. Key liturgical commemorations and significant historical dates for the year are also noted.

The Desk Calendar does not include diocesan and most national events, such as diocesan assemblies or seminary commencements. These dates are available on the web calendar found on the homepage of oca.org.

This year's theme, "Behold, I make all things new" (Revelation 21:5), invites reflection on the life of the Church as a continual renewal in and through our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ. It reminds the faithful that the Church's life is never static, but always being renewed by grace—whether in worship, service, or mission. The cover features images that capture the past year's ongoing growth and renewal in the life of the Orthodox Church in America.

Throughout, the calendar includes selected quotations from the Holy Fathers, the saints, and contemporary teachers on the theme of growth and renewal. Each month offers a brief reflection on repentance, transformation, and the new life given to us in Christ, the life that makes all things new.

Metropolitan Council Meets for its Regular Fall 2025 Session

The Metropolitan Council of the Orthodox Church in America met for its regular Fall 2025 Session from October 8-9 in Springfield, VA. Meetings were held at the Hotel Belvoir and at St. Luke Serbian Orthodox Church in McLean, VA.

This was the first session of the Metropolitan Council following the 21st All-American Council in Phoenix, AZ, during which six new at-large members were elected. Several dioceses have also appointed or elected new representatives.

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon opened the Council session on Wednesday, October 8, with a *mo-lieben*. After the minutes of the previous meetings were approved, the Council heard the report of the Metropolitan. In his report, His Beatitude reflected on the enduring example of Saint Tikhon, Patriarch of Moscow and Enlightener of North America, whose life and vision continue to inspire the Church's mission in this land. Drawing from Saint Tikhon's emphasis on conciliarity and collaboration among bishops, clergy, and laity, His Beatitude invited the Council to view its administrative responsibilities as expressions of unity in Christ and co-labor in the Apostolic work of the Church. He also expressed gratitude for the tireless efforts of the Chancery staff, whose small team continues to sustain the pastoral, canonical, and administrative life of the Church with dedication and humility.

Archpriest Alessandro Margheritino, Chancellor of the Orthodox Church in America, offered his report and gave an overview of the work of the chancery, various personnel changes, reorganizations in some of the departments and offices, and upcoming projects and priorities. Father Alessandro also reported on some of his recent domestic and international trips.

The Council then heard the Pension Board's report presented by Archpriest John Dresko. This was followed by a report from Mr. David Lane, the Metropolitan Council's liaison to the Pension Board. The Council then heard a presentation from a representative of Satty, Levine & Ciacco, CPAs, who provided a detailed overview of the recent audit. The report summarized the audit's principal findings and financial statements, highlighting the Church's sound overall financial condition. Mr. Mark Hamilton, General Counsel of the Orthodox Church in America offered the Legal Report, and Protodeacon Peter Ilchuk, All-American Council Manager, offered his report on the recent 21st All-American Council in Phoenix, but also shared some information about the next Council that will take place in Dallas, TX in July 2028.

Archpriest Justin Patterson, Project Manager of the Departments of the Orthodox Church in America then offered his report and presented candidates for the

Church Planting Grants program. The Council's decision is now submitted to the Holy Synod for confirmation. The final report of the day was offered by Archpriest Nicholas Solak, Director of the Office of Pastoral Life, who gave an update on the various programs under the auspices of the Office.

At the conclusion of the meeting on the first day, the Church Officers and Mr David Lane, Esq. and at-large member of the Metropolitan Council, offered an orientation session on the Metropolitan Council, its composition, duties, history, and on the legal fiduciary responsibility of its members.

On Thursday, October 9, the day began with His Beatitude presiding at the celebration of the Divine Liturgy on the the Feast of the Glorification of Saint Tikhon, Patriarch of Moscow and Enlightener of North America. Celebrating with His Beatitude were Fr. Alessandro Margheritino, Archpriest John Vitko, rector of St. Luke Serbian Orthodox Church, Archpriest Raymond Browne, and Priest Andrew Smith, who delivered the homily.

Following the Liturgy, the Council reconvened to hear additional reports provided by Mr. Greg Honshul from the Property Committee with an update of the sale of Westwood. Mr Honshul indicated that, provided no unforeseen complications arise, the closing is expected to take place by mid 2026. The Council then heard a report from Priest David Bozeman, Secretary of the Orthodox Church in America, and Mr. Andrew Smith for the Treasurer Report. The Council reviewed and approved the proposed 2026 budget, and discussed plans for the 2026 Metropolitan Council sessions.

In accordance with the Statute of the Orthodox Church in America, the Council also considered nominations for the positions of internal auditors and decided to re-appointed the current three internal auditors to serve for another three-year term.

His Beatitude concluded the meetings by expressing gratitude to the members of the Council for their service to the Church. The 2025 Fall Session of the Metropolitan Council was then adjourned and concluded with a prayer.

Prophet Joel Commemorated on October 19

The Prophet Joel (800 B.C.) predicted the desolation of Jerusalem. He also prophesied that the Holy Spirit would be poured out upon all people, through the Savior of the world (Joel 2:28-32). The hymnographer Anatolius links Joel's prophecy to the Nativity of the Lord. In the Praises at Matins on the Sunday following the Nativity, he refers to Joel 2:30, saying that the blood refers to the Incarnation, the fire to the Divinity, and the pillars of smoke to the Holy Spirit.

Luke 8:5-15 (Gospel)

“A sower went out to sow his seed. And as he sowed, some fell by the wayside; and it was trampled down, and the birds of the air devoured it. Some fell on rock; and as soon as it sprang up, it withered away because it lacked moisture. And some fell among thorns, and the thorns sprang up with it and choked it. But others fell on good ground, sprang up, and yielded a crop a hundredfold.” When He had said these things He cried, “He who has ears to hear, let him hear!” Then His disciples asked Him, saying, “What does this parable mean?” And He said, “To you it has been given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God, but to the rest it is given in parables, that ‘Seeing they may not see, And hearing they may not understand.’ Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. Those by the wayside are the ones who hear; then the devil comes and takes away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved. But the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear, receive the word with joy; and these have no root, who believe for a while and in time of temptation fall away. Now the ones that fell among thorns are those who, when they have heard, go out and are choked with cares, riches, and pleasures of life, and bring no fruit to maturity. But the ones that fell on the good ground are those who, having heard the word with a noble and good heart, keep it and bear fruit with patience.

2 Corinthians 11:31-12:9 (Epistle)

The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is blessed forever, knows that I am not lying. In Damascus the governor, under Aretas the king, was guarding the city of the Damascenes with a garrison, desiring to arrest me; but I was let down in a basket through a window in the wall, and escaped from his hands. It is doubtless not profitable for me to boast. I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord: I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago – whether in the body I do not know, or whether out of the body I do not know, God knows – such a one was caught up to the third heaven. And I know such a man – whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows – how he was caught up into Paradise and heard inexpressible words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter. Of such a one I will boast; yet of myself I will not boast, except in my infirmities. For though I might desire to boast, I will not be a fool; for I will speak the truth. But I refrain, lest anyone should think of me above what he sees me to be or hears from me. And lest I should be exalted above measure by the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, a messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I be exalted above measure. Concerning this thing I pleaded with the Lord three times that it might depart from me. And He said to me, “My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness.” Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.
