### **His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon Announces Sanctity of Life Sunday, January 25, 2026**

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon has designated Sunday, January 25, 2026, as Sanctity of Life Sunday for the Orthodox Church in America, in conjunction with the annual March for Life in Washington, DC, which will take place on Friday, January 23, 2026.

His Beatitude's archpastoral message is provided below. Liturgical prayers and petitions for Sanctity of Life Sunday, as well as additional resources, are available on the OCA Sanctity of Life Resource Page.

Orthodox Christians are also invited to gather for the March for Life. As in previous years, Orthodox participation is being coordinated by Orthodox Christians for Life.

On Friday, January 23, the day will begin with the celebration of the Divine Liturgy at 8:00 AM at St. Nicholas Cathedral, followed by a breakfast reception. Participants will then gather at the National Mall. At 12:30 PM, His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon will lead the faithful in prayer for the Service of Supplication for an End to Abortion, prior to the beginning of the March for Life, which concludes at the Supreme Court.

All are invited to join His Beatitude and Orthodox faithful

from across the nation in prayerfully remembering the victims of abortion and bearing witness to the sanctity of human life.

To the clergy, monastics, and faithful of the Orthodox Church in America, beloved children in the Lord:

During these winter months, the Church celebrates a number of feasts dedicated to the appearing of the Lord in the flesh.

He has willed to be present in our basic weakness and our everyday needs; to be present among all the changes and cycles of nature and history that swirl around us; to be present in the highest aspirations of human culture, which reach beyond this life and grasp at the undying life of the age to come.

In the midst of this luminous season of feasts, we also mark our annual Sanctity of Life Sunday. Reflecting on the meaning of the sanctity of life in light of the great feasts that we have celebrated and will soon celebrate, we realize that the Lord has come so that we might have life and have it more abundantly, not just in the age to come, but in this present age as well.

Therefore, every moment of human life, from conception to natural death, is infinitely precious, because every moment of human life, every facet of human existence—except for sin—has been hallowed **Con't pg 4**

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## His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon Celebrates Services for the Feast of Theophany

On January 6, 2026, His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon celebrated the great feast of the Theophany of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ at St. Mark Orthodox Church, Bethesda, MD. Concelebrating with His Beatitude were Archpriest Alessandro Margheritino, Chancellor of the Orthodox Church in America, Archpriest Gregory Safchuk, rector of St. Mark's and Dean of the Washington Deanery, and Priest Nicholas Roth. Also serving were Deacon Michael Mihailov and Deacon Matthew Prentice. The liturgical celebration was accompanied by the beautiful responses sung by the St. Mark's choir, under the direction of choir director Sharon Sielinski.

In his homily, His Beatitude reflected on Theophany as the sanctification of all creation. He spoke of the Lord's baptism in the Jordan as the renewal not only of the world itself, but also of the faithful, who are called to live in the light of Christ's divine revelation. Following the Divine Liturgy, a festive meal was served.

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### Saint Athanasius the Great, Archbishop of Alexandria Commemorated on January 18

Saints Athanasius and Cyril were Archbishops of Alexandria. These wise teachers of truth and defenders of Christ's Church share a joint Feast in recognition of their dogmatic writings which affirm the truth of the Orthodox Faith, correctly interpret the Holy Scripture, and censure the delusions of the heretics.

Saint Athanasius took part in the First Ecumenical Council when he was still a deacon. He surpassed everyone there in his zeal to uphold the teaching that Christ is consubstantial (homoousios) with the Father, and not merely a creature, as the Arians proclaimed.

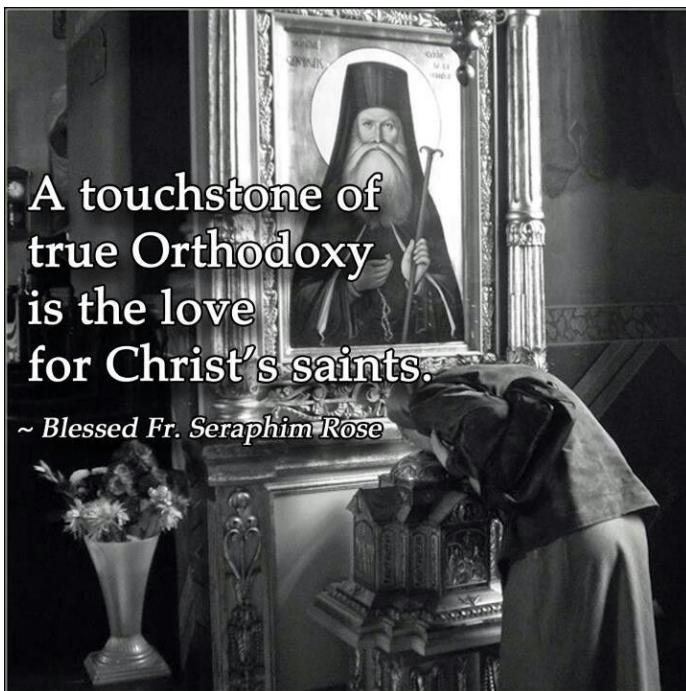
This radiant beacon of Orthodoxy spent most of his life in exile from his See, because of the plotting of his enemies. He returned to his flock as he was approaching the end of his life. Like an evening star, he illumined the Orthodox faithful with his words for a little while, then reposed in 373. He is also commemorated on May 2 (the transfer of his holy relics).

## Luke 18:35-43 (Gospel)

Then it happened, as He was coming near Jericho, that a certain blind man sat by the road begging. And hearing a multitude passing by, he asked what it meant. So they told him that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. And he cried out, saying, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Then those who went before warned him that he should be quiet; but he cried out all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" So Jesus stood still and commanded him to be brought to Him. And when he had come near, He asked him, saying, "What do you want Me to do for you?" He said, "Lord, that I may receive my sight." Then Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has made you well." And immediately he received his sight, and followed Him, glorifying God. And all the people, when they saw it, gave praise to God.

## 1 Timothy 1:15-17 (Epistle)

This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. However, for this reason I obtained mercy, that in me first Jesus Christ might show all longsuffering, as a pattern to those who are going to believe on Him for everlasting life. Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, to God who alone is wise, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

## Theophany Celebrated with Ordinations and Great Blessing of Water

On Monday, January 5, and Tuesday, January 6, services were held in celebration of the great feast of Theophany, at the Diocesan Cathedral, Holy Trinity Cathedral, Chicago, IL.

Festal services began on Friday morning with the celebration of the Vespertine Liturgy served by His Eminence Archbishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest, and Deacon Timothy Heinbokel. At the conclusion of the Liturgy, the Great Blessing of Water was celebrated, and the festal icon was processed into the center of the Cathedral by Priest Alexander Koranda, Cathedral Dean. Later that evening, the Archbishop celebrated Great Compline and Festal Matins. Serving with His Eminence were Fr. Alexander, Archpriest Justin Matthews, Priest John Reavis, Deacon Paul Garklavs, Deacon Timothy Heinbokel, and Deacon Jarrod Huffman.

On Tuesday morning, the Archbishop celebrated the Divine Liturgy with Priest Alexander Koranda, Archpriest Philip Lashbrook, Archpriest Justin Matthews, Priest Nikolai Lochmatow, Priest Mark Hodges, Priest Joshua Coolman, Priest John Reavis, and Deacons Paul, Timothy, Raphael Fadil, and Jarrod. The Cathedral Choir was directed by Reader Vladimir Lymar.

After the Great Entrance, Deacon Jarrod was ordained to the Holy Priesthood and following the consecration of the Holy Gifts, Subdeacon Joshua Hodges was ordained to the diaconate. After the Prayer at the Ambo, the Great Blessing of Water was held and the Archbishop blessed the temple and faithful gathered.

The Archbishop concluded the services by offering remarks to the newly ordained priest and deacon, along with their families. The Archbishop also welcomed the faithful from St. Vladimir's Seminary and St. Stephen Church, Lima, OH, who traveled to Chicago to attend the ordinations. Following the Prayers of Thanksgiving, a reception was held in the parish hall.
